About the Project.

The Project is now up and running. Here are some highlights of the first three months.

#### September

September saw the creation of a temporary display using copies of the Cemetery archives which was displayed at the Guildhall during the Oswestry Heritage Weekend. A permanent display will eventually replace the existing display and should be going on tour to local venues during the Project.

The Cemetery documents were sent to Shropshire Archives to be conserved and catalogued.

Some of the Oswestry Family and Local History Group were amongst the first volunteers to join the Project. They are an enthusiastic group who have already prepared a summary genealogy for 100 people in the Cemetery.

#### October

October saw the formal launch of the Project. Local historian, John Pryce-Jones, put the foundation of the Cemetery in context. With the increase of the population and the amount of non-conformist religions there was a real need for a new cemetery.

Conservation work began. In the first two weeks, Linda Boden, Conservation Assistant, sorted the '

grotty box' containing documents in very poor condition. The documents that are repairable will be conserved and prepared for cataloguing. This will enable them to be made accessible to the public.

#### November

November saw training and a site visit for the photographic volunteers. The volunteers have been getting to grips with wonky gravestones and uploading images to SkyDrive. Some trial images have been submitted and the results are looking very promising. The images will eventually be put on a Virtual Volunteer website so volunteers can transcribe the memorial inscriptions. There will be further news about this in the next newsletter.

A start was made on cataloguing the Cemetery documents by Karen Young, the Cataloguing Assistant.

We commissioned a new website which will host Oswestry Town Council's archive catalogue and the grave survey.








